


PRESENT PERFECT – Auxiliary – **HAVE**

<p style="text-align: center;">Present Perfect</p> 	<p>Use:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ to connect the past and the present. ✓ finished actions that are important now. ✓ for news or something that's happened recently. ✓ for situations continuing up to now.
<p style="text-align: center;">FIRST & SECOND PERSON (I, we, you, they)</p> <p>Affirmative: SUBJECT + HAVE + PAST PARTICIPLE FORM + object, etc.</p> <p>I, we, you, they + have played + football this morning.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">THIRD PERSON (He, she, it):</p> <p>Affirmative: SUBJECT + HAS + PAST PARTICIPLE FORM + object, etc.</p> <p>He, she, it + has played + football recently.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Negative: SUBJECT + HAVE NOT / HAS NOT + PAST PARTICIPLE FORM OF THE VERB + (object / place / time)</p> <p style="text-align: center;">FIRST & SECOND PERSON: I, we, you, they + haven't + played + football yet. THIRD PERSON: He, she, it + hasn't + played + football before.</p>	
<p>Interrogative:</p> <p>a. Yes / No questions: HAVE / HAS + SUBJECT + PAST PARTICIPLE FORM OF THE VERB + (object / place / time) ?</p> <p>Have I, we, you, they + played + football before? Yes, they have. / No, they haven't. Has he, she, it + played + football already? Yes, he has. / No, he hasn't</p> <p>b. W/H questions: W/H QUESTION WORD + HAVE / HAS + SUBJECT + PAST PARTICIPLE FORM OF THE VERB + (object / place / time) ?</p> <p>What have I, we, you, they + done + this morning? They have been to the supermarket. Where has he, she, it + gone + on holiday? He has gone to Europe.</p>
