- 8. "At" verb + at or to = some verbs can be followed by 'at' or 'to' but with a difference in meaning:
- a. Shout at someone and be angry with them: = She got very angry and started shouting at me.
- b. Shout to attract their attention: = She shouted at me from across the park.
- c. Throw something at someone/ something to hit them: = Someone threw an egg at the president.
- d. Throw something so they can catch it: = Dalibor threw the tennis ball to me.
