Interjections

Interjections are words that you can insert into a sentence to convey emotions. They may express:

- Joy = Hurrah! I have passed the exam!
- Grief = Oh no! He's crashed his car.
- Surprise = Hah! Is that all you have to offer? / What! You failed!
- Approval = Bravo! You have done a good job. / Good! You passed.
- Fear = Aah! Watch out for that spider.
- Disgust = Eww! That movie was so gory. / Ugh! I'm never doing that again!
- Making a mistake = Oops! Sorry!
- Pain = Ouch! That hurt.
- Desire for silence = Shh! The show is about to start.
- Dismay = Uh oh! The teacher's caught him.
- Relief = Phew! I can't believe we actually finished it all.
- Admiration/ appreciation = Wow! That's really great news!
- Celebration = Yippee! We won. / Yay! The exams are over.
- Anger/annoyance = Hey! Stop messing with me!

Any list of interjections used in English is extremely long. Not only are there many of them, but they can also change their meaning depending on the tone used.

They do not always have to come at the beginning of a sentence. For example:

"So, you don't like spinach too much, *huh*?" = in this context "huh" would be the interjection designed to convey the emotion of confusion, sarcasm or dismay at the dislike of spinach.
