Recording No. 7 – Sarah – Australia:

Austria and Sweden have become the latest European countries to ditch coal-based energy; they join Belgium, which was first to go coal-free in 2016. Portugal will also wave goodbye to coal next year, two years ahead of schedule.

Several other European nations are striding towards a fossil-free future. The UK hit a milestone during the COVID-19 lockdown by going two months without coal-based power for the first time since it kick started the Industrial Revolution in the 19th century. Along with France, Slovakia, Ireland and Italy, the UK expects to eliminate coal within five years. The Netherlands, Finland, Hungary and Denmark are all planning to end coal-fired power by 2030.

"Coal is now in terminal decline all across Europe," says Kathrin Gutmann of the UK-based lobby group Europe Beyond Coal.
