Simple, Compound and Complex Sentences

a. Simple Sentences

Simple sentences have only one clause. What is a clause? A clause is a group of words with a subject and a verb. But simple sentences can have more than one subject, verb and direct object. These are called compound subjects, verbs and direct objects.

b. Compound Sentences

Compound sentences have two or more clauses joined by a co-ordinating conjunction. Some common co-ordinating conjunctions are *and*, *but* and *or*. The two clauses of a compound sentence are always separated by a comma.

Clause 1		Clause 2
David works hard at school,	and	he gets good grades.
He studies during the week,	but	he has fun at the weekend.
He and his friends see a movie,	or	they go to a concert.

c. Complex Sentences

Complex sentences have two clauses joined by a subordinating conjunction. Some common subordinating conjunctions are when, because and that.

Clause 1		Clause 2
David feels tired	when	he gets home at night.
He is tired	because	he worked hard.
He wishes	that	he could go to a movie.
