So, such, enough, too – to indicate degree¹

So* / such = 'very'. "It's <u>so</u> cold today!" "That's <u>such</u> a pretty dress!"

Too* = more than necessary. "£150! That's much <u>too</u> expensive for a pair of shoes."

Enough = the right amount of something. "We've bought a new car, so that we have <u>enough</u> space for all of us."

*can also be used with much and many to talk about the amount of something. So much/many = a lot of something; too much/many = more than we want or need:

"I'm so going to shout at him when I see him!"

"I've got so much work to do tonight."

"There are just too many cars on the roads these days."

1. So:

For degree, so + adjective = "I love watching Mr Bean. He's <u>so</u> funny!"

so + adverb = "He plays the piano <u>so</u> well!"

For amount, so + much/many + noun = "What a great party! We had <u>so</u> much fun!" (UC)

"We visited <u>so</u> many places." (C)

Verb + so = "I like his music <u>so</u> much."

So + nouns and verbs (informal, spoken English) = "That dress is <u>so</u> last year!"

2. Such:

Before an adjective and noun = "That's <u>such</u> a cute dog!" (C)

"We had <u>such</u> nice weather on holiday!" (UC)

Note:

so/such + that for cause and effect / reason and result:

"She felt **so** upset that she started to cry."

"They had **such** an awful time that they said they'd never go again."

3. Too:

too + adjective = "This restaurant's <u>too</u> crowded. Let's go somewhere else."
too + adverb = "You're walking <u>too</u> fast! Slow down!
too much or too many + noun = "Ugh! You've put <u>too</u> much sugar in my tea!" (UC)
"I ate <u>too</u> many biscuits." (C)
not + too + negative = it isn't a problem! "It's not **too** late to buy tickets for the final."

4. Enough:

adjective + enough in positive sentences / questions = "Is it warm <u>enough</u> for you in here?" not + adjective + enough in negative sentences = "He doesn't sleep well <u>enough</u>." enough + noun in positive sentences / questions = "Do we have <u>enough</u> money?" not + enough + noun in negative sentences = "There aren't <u>enough</u> knives and forks for all the guests." sometimes enough is followed by to + verb infinitive = "She's definitely smart **enough** to become director."
