

## Travel and Trip

- **Travel** = a verb (the action). To go from one place to another.
- **Trip** = a noun. A journey.

*“Rosy’s husband is on a business **trip**. He often **travels** to many different countries. Rosy met her husband on a **trip** to Paris.”*

Trip can also be a verb, but it means to almost fall while walking usually after catching your foot on something.

*He didn’t see the cat and he tripped over it.*

Some more uses of the word Trip:

- A day trip usually refers to a tourist activity that occupies your entire day.
- A business trip is when you travel for business reasons.
- A round trip means to travel somewhere and return to where you started, there and back (= a return trip)
