Who owns water? The US landowners putting barbed wire across rivers - 15 March, 2018

As Scott Carpenter and a few friends paddled down the Pecos River in New Mexico, USA, in May, 2017, the man at the front suddenly shouted and told the others to go to the side of the river. The group stopped just before they hit three strings of barbed wire across the river.

The sign hanging from the wire read "PRIVATE PROPERTY: No trespassing".

One of them got into the water to lift the wire with a paddle for the others to go under.

It's something that is happening more and more in New Mexico. A recent attempt to legally privatize streams has made public river users like Carpenter feel worried.

Now, New Mexico has become a battleground for the future of public waterways. The state government and landowners are on one side of the battle and anglers and boaters are on the other. At the centre of the argument is the question: who owns the water that brings life to the dry west?
