<u>Would</u>

Would /woo d/ is an auxiliary - a modal auxiliary - which means it must always be used with a verb. We use it mainly to:

- a. talk about the past
- b. talk about the future in the past
- c. express the conditional mood
- d. other functions, such as:
 - expressing desire
 - polite requests and questions
 - > an opinion or hope
 - ➤ a wish
 - presumption or expectation
 - > uncertainty
 - negative comments
 - ➤ a regret

a. To talk about the past. <u>Would for the past tense of will or going to:</u>

"I thought it would rain, so I brought my umbrella." Using it as a kind of past tense in reported speech: "She said that she would buy some eggs." = "I will buy some eggs."

Past refusals:

"He wanted a divorce, but his wife would not agree." Used rather like used to when talking about habitual past behaviour:

"Every summer we'd go to the seaside."

- b. The future in the past "In London, she met the man that she would one day i.e. something that marry."
 has not happened at
- the time we are talking about.
- c. The conditionals. <u>2nd conditional:</u>

"If he lost his job, he would have no money."

3rd conditional:

"If I had won the lottery, I would have bought a car."

Used with the 2nd conditional for advice:

"I wouldn't eat that if I were you."

<u>Sometimes the condition is "understood" and there does</u> not have to be an "if" clause:

"Someone who liked John would probably like John's father too." = If someone liked John, they would probably like John's father.

d. Other functions: Desire or inclination:

"I'd love to live here".

Polite requests and questions:

"Would you open the door, please?" = politer than, "Open the door, please."

An Opinion or hope:

"I would imagine that they'll buy a new one."

A Wish:

"I wish you would stay." = I really want you to stay.

Presumption or expectation:

"That would be Joe calling. I'll answer it."

An Uncertainty:

"He would seem to be getting better." = less certain than, "He seems to be getting better."

Negative comment:

"They would say that, wouldn't they?"

Regret (poetic):

"Would that it were true!" = If only it were true or, we wish that it were true!
